- <u>One-Time Clothing Allowance</u> received allocation of \$11,500 to provide one-time clothing allowance for eligible youth in the LINKS program.
- <u>Food & Nutrition Services ARPA Funds</u>: Alamance County DSS allotted \$177,198 – we currently have \$88,599 available.

#### Did You KNOW?

- Reimbursement for services are received through both 1571 reimbursement and direct issuances
- Funding allocations are provided for most services; however, most are capped allocations and some are quickly exhausted.

# Services - Ms. Lynette Wellons/Assistant Director of Services -

Assistant Director Wellons reported the agency is promoting Positive Psychology throughout the agency.

The agency has weekly sessions staff can attend held with Mary McGinty Shaw, SW that focus on meditation, Walk/Wiggle/Giggle sessions as well as WE Care Sessions and Book Club.

We hope to roll out Compassion Fatigue Sessions to our Leadership Team in an effort to help staff with daily work demands. We are hopeful to roll out in November.

### Child Support -

Ms. McCullough reported the Child Support Unit recently completed State Review/Audit. There were six cases reviewed and zero findings – 100% compliant.

#### **Adult Services -**

Ms. McCullough reported Adult Services completed case audit – sample of cases pulled (10) – The findings were good; however, there were some forms not completed due to complexity of the 15-page form. The narrative findings were good.

# Children Services Program Manager: Ms. Angela Cole/Ms. Rebecca Lambert

Ms. Cole reported Child Welfare Supervisors are not in rotation to ensure cases are being worked.

**Specific Goal:** Child Welfare—DSS will initiate 95% of all screened-in reports within assigned time frames.

#### September 2022:

Assessors are mandated to initiate CPS reports within the timeframe specified or diligent efforts to initiate must continue until the initiation has been completed. For the month of September, 11 reports were not initiated timely. For all of those reports, the assessors made an appropriate number of attempts via a variety of methods to initiate within the specific timeframe.

We have 5 staff in rotation when there should be 20. We currently have contract staff in place to help with the overload.

#### Question: Can you use interns?

Social Work interns are not allowed to carry cases. All new Social Workers have to complete 72 hours of Per-Service Training before they can work a case. And with MSW interns, they have to be supervised by MSW and currently we only have one within Child Welfare.

Ms. Lambert reported the following:

- Supervisors are doing field work and carrying caseloads to support workers in back end as in other areas
- Surpassed performance management goal and achieved 97% of foster children seen every month for the past year
- OSRI audit notification has been received
- Starting to examine alternative MAPP class offerings and recruitment opportunities to grow local foster parent base to increase local placements which subsequently supports both workers and families

### Economic Support: Ms. Jamie Hatfield/Ms. Danae Pickard/Ms. Wendy Roberts

Ms. Roberts reported we continue to receive record number of applications. NC FAST system went down for two days which shifted a dip in services for customers. The PHE has been extended and is slated to end January 2023.

Ms. Pickard reported the additional Food & Nutrition allotments that have been given to customers since the start of the pandemic will end in January 2023. This will be a huge blow to the elderly population. We are collaborating with WIC and will work with community partners regarding food banks and food pantries to assist.

Ms. Pickard reported we are gearing up for the start of Energy season with LIEAP and all other energy programs. The State will start sending out materials very soon and we will post on our website.

We currently hired 12 people this month – there is a trend up of applications.

### **Child Care: Candice Gobble**

Director Gobble reported DSS is currently at 82% spending co-efficient for Child Care. There is currently no waiting list. Child Care Supervisor is currently conducting outreach with Economic Services and WIC to get the word out there are slots available for child care.

# Question: Vouchers are great – but what happens when parents incur fees and they are not able to pay?

All day care applications are income based – some families may incur parent fees. But if income changes, please encourage customers to contact Child Care to report change so fees can be adjusted accordingly.

### IT Report: Mr. Jason Cole

Mr. Cole reported we recently added 4 Kiosk Computers in the front lobby at DSS to assist customers with applying for services, as well as recertifications.

# <u>Director's Report – Candice J. Gobble, Director–</u>

Director Gobble reported from Western Regional Director's Meeting that Medicaid Expansion is on the horizon. If Expansion occurs this will impact Alamance Co. DSS – staffing patterns will increase as well as technology needs, etc.

The board expressed how can they help with expansion? DSS Board will help with advocacy and speak with representatives responsible for Alamance County and continue to advocate for the necessary items that will be needed to make expansion work: staffing, equipment and space.

# **New Business:**

# **Public Comment Time Limits: Chair Norwick**

Discussions were held regarding public comment time limits. The decision was made as follows:

- The comment time limit will be five minutes or less
- The parameters of the time limit will be added to DSS website
- The board will not engage in dialogue during public comment
- All personnel issues will be discussed in closed sessions

Action: Maria Hernandez, Vice-Chair made motion to approve public comment time limits – Dr. Ernest Eason seconded. All approved.

# NEMT – Non-Emergency Medical Transportation

Ms. Jamie Hatfield, Economic Services Program Manager presented the following:

### What is NEMT?

Non-Emergency Medical Transportation is a benefit for NC Medicaid beneficiaries. It allows beneficiaries to access health care services from Medicaid providers and is a covered service in both NC Medicaid Managed Care and NC Medicaid Direct.

NEMT consist of transportation to and from a Medicaid-covered service on a non-emergent basis or mileage reimbursement for beneficiaries who have their own form of transportation.

Transportation to Medicaid covered services include, but not limited to:

- Primary Care Visit
- Dentist
- Pharmacy
- Physical Therapy
- Hospital (inpatient stays)

#### **NEMT Criteria:**

### **Medicaid only pays for transportation:**

- By the least expensive mode available and appropriate for the beneficiary
- To the nearest appropriate enrolled NC Medicaid provided (this is defined as a one-way trip over 30 miles from pick-up location)
- For a Medicaid covered service

### Medicaid will NOT pay for transportation for the following individuals/services:

- MQB-Q, B or E only beneficiaries (Medicaid program that pays Medicaid premiums, deductibles and co-insurance)
- Client in deductible status (They are eligible for NEMT once their deductible is met)
- NC Health Choice
- Nursing home beneficiaries (The facility is responsible for providing transportation)
- Individuals receiving certain mental health services that have transportation cost included in their reimbursement

#### **Transportation Services:**

NEMT services include pick-up and drop-off. It may be provided in the following ways:

• Van or car service

- Public transportation
- Taxi
- Volunteer using their own vehicles
- County Employee using county vehicles on their own

# The local agency may provide:

- Bus passes or tokens for public transportation
- Mileage reimbursement or gas vouchers for those who have access to their own mode of transportation

### Individuals eligible for mileage reimbursement or gas vouchers include:

- Beneficiaries
- Financially responsible family members
- Non-financially responsible family members
- Friends
- Volunteers

# Services may also include travel related expenses such as:

- Overnight lodging
- Meals
- Parking fees and tolls

### **Alamance County Contract Vendors:**

- Alamance County Transportation Authority (ACTA)
- CJ Medical Transportation
- Golden Eagle Taxi
- Alamance House (AL Holding, Inc.)

# <u>Local Agency Responsibilities (The local agency where the Medicaid beneficiary is physically located)</u> -

- Inform beneficiaries of their right to transportation
- Maintain a transportation log to track each trip request from intake to disposition
- Conduct assessments every 12 months, or as needed, to determine the need for services
- Ensure the beneficiary is Medicaid eligible at the time of the trip and the trip meets the transportation criteria
- Have a phone system with an answering machine for taking trip requests or cancellations 24 hours a day
- Arrange the appropriate mode of transportation
- Authorize payments to contracted vendors through NC Tracks
- Complete No-Show report
- Safety & Risk Management

### **Transportation Timeline:**



Only contracted vendors are paid in NC Tracks. For those customers who use neighbors and/or friends to transport, they are paid differently. The Fiscal Unit will assist with those payments.

### **Question: What about the PACE Program?**

### **NC Medicaid Managed Care:**

Starting July 1, 2021, most Medicaid beneficiaries began receiving care through a health plan's network of doctors called NC Managed Care. The first launch of NC Managed Care included most families and children, pregnant women and people who are blind or disabled and not receiving Medicare.

- 1. United Health Care Community Plan
- 2. AmeriHealth Caritas North Carolina
- 3. Blue Cross/Blue Shield Healthy Blue
- 4. Well Care
- 5. Carolina Complete Health

NC will launch the Medicaid Managed Care Behavioral Health and Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities Tailored Plan will launch on **April 1, 2023**. This is a health plan for individuals with significant behavioral health needs and intellectual/developmental disabilities (I/DDs) which will be managed by VAYA Health.

Under NC Medicaid Managed Care, health plans must provide NEMT services for all Medicaid eligible individuals. Health Plans may use brokers to arrange and provide NEMT services or contract directly with transportation providers.

Anyone wishing to apply for NEMT services – please contact Alamance Co. DSS (336) 229-2916. (In-person interviews are not required – an assessment can be completed via phone).

### **Transportation requests must be made:**

- 3 business days for local appointments
- 5 business days for out-of-county trips
